## Why It Matters

Even well-meaning agents can carry unconscious bias. These biases—if unchecked—can lead to unequal treatment, Fair Housing violations, and missed opportunities to build trust across communities.

| "They probably won't want to live there." | Steering based on assumptions | Present all options that meet their stated criteria   |

| "I relate better to this client."         | Unequal effort or attention   | Use standardized workflows for<br>all clients         |

## **Bias Interruption Toolkit**

#### Use these strategies to override shortcut thinking:

- Standardize your process: Use the same intake forms, showing routines, and follow-up cadence for every client.
- Pause and reflect: When making assumptions, ask: "Did the client say this, or am I projecting?"
- Use inclusive language: Avoid coded terms like "safe" or "good schools"—offer data and let clients decide.
- Educate yourself: Take NAR's Bias Override course or try the Harvard Implicit Association Test.

### Sample "Pause and Pivot" Phrases

- You probably wouldn't be interested in that neighborhood."
- "Here are all the options that match your criteria—let me know what stands out."
- This home feels more suited to your lifestyle."
- "This property has features you mentioned let's see how it aligns with what you're looking for..,"
- X "They probably won't want to live there."
- "Let's include all areas that match your criteria—you can decide what feels right."



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
